Orbital ATK Receives Foreign Military Sales Award for Sidewinder Missile Rocket Motors

Orbital ATK received a contract award from the U. S. Air Force for production of rocket motors for the AIM-9P missile. The award is an indefinite-delivery/indefinite-quantity contract estimated to be \$67 million when fully optioned. The order adds to the more than 30,000 Sidewinder motors the company has produced to date.

The Sidewinder Missile System has a proven record for effectiveness and reliability at home and around the world. This award will help our allies defend shared interests for years to come (per Pat Nolan, VP and GM of Orbital ATK's Missile Products Division). This FMS version will be delivered to our allies with the same outstanding record with which thousands of other tactical air-to-air rocket motors were delivered.

The AIM-9P Sidewinder missile has received significant upgrades since it was developed in 1978, with the latest version featuring Orbital ATK's SR116-HP-1 reduced smoke rocket motor. Work for the current FMS order is expected to run through February 2022.

10 Insider Tips Only Nurses WILL TELL YOU!

- 1) Get a second opinion BEFORE your surgery. Our current healthcare system incentivizes doctors to advise high-cost procedures (that might be avoided). Ask about rehabilitation for successful recovery, 7) possible negative aspects, etc., and possibly consider a THIRD opinion from an objective doctor.
- 2) Appoint one family spokesperson. Your nurse will have more time for you if she only has to answer questions from one family member. Coordinate your questions through one person.
- 3) Avoid teaching hospitals in July. medical students become interns/1st year residents, first-years become second-years, etc. These new doctors are thrust into direct patient care, where mistakes can happen. University of CA/San Diego researchers found that fatal medication errors spike by 10% in July, but in no other month. If surgery is mandatory, consider another hospital.
- 4) Watch carefully to ensure EVERYone entering your room sanitizes their hands. This is extremely important for reducing a patient's chance of infection. If you don't see them sanitize their hands, ask, "Could you please wash your hands?"... especially the nurses and doctors. Going from patient to patient, it's vital!
- 5) Do as much as you can for yourself/the patient. 9) Maximize your/patient's time with the nurse by doing as much as you can on your own. Bring your own food/ beverages, ask the nurse if there's anything you can do for the patient (brushing patient's teeth, handling feeding, etc.). Any type of care done by the family is 10) Understand why your medications might not not just a help to nurses, it aids in the healing process. It will better prepare the caregiver for in-home rehabilitation, as well.
- 6) Have honest end-of-life discussions before they are necessary. If family members don't know of Do Not Resuscitate orders by the patient, they may demand "do everything you can" to the staff, ignoring the patient's wishes. CPR can break multiple ribs, possibly require a prolonged ICU stay for the patient with a barrage of toxic medicines, and even "indefinite" ventilator time. This may be the opposite of what the patient truly desires. Learn what you/your loved one truly wants at this difficult time (long before the situation is urgent), and ensure the entire family and

- the staff know as well. (Ed. Note: A good book to read is "It's OK To Die", by Monica Williams-Murphy, MD and Kristian Murphy. Visit OKtoDie.com.)
- Have someone stay with the patient 16 hours/ day. A second set of eyes/ears is always helpful! Family members/loved ones should try to take turns to ensure someone is in the room ~16 hours each day, particularly if the patient is older. Sometimes the more aggressive/"fussy" patients take more time away from the guieter patients. Be assertive, but nice.
- Every July, 8) Don't be afraid to ask questions. Ask what time the physician conducts daily rounds, so a visitor will be available with the patient. Patients get better care when the family is actively involved. Ask staff about the patient's care, reasons for procedures, etc., even if you think it might annoy the professional. You should be proactive (and an advocate) for the patient's well being. It could save a life! Example: Ask why certain medications may be necessary. Double check the ID information on the patient's armband. It's important! If questions aren't urgent, don't ask on the nurse's first visit of the shift — wait on the second pass through, when more time might be available to properly address all questions.
 - Being kind to your nurse matters! Being rude to the staff can possibly delay processes, if patients are physically/verbally abusive, and dealing with them becomes difficult. So, be assertive, but NICE, for possibly faster service...and maybe even a few perks!
 - arrive promptly. Many nurses are overloaded with patients, with several patients' medications scheduled to be delivered simultaneously. Some patients may require special needs with meds (crushing pills to blend with applesauce, feeding to patients with specific requirements, etc.). So, be "patient!" Also, if your call button request isn't answered immediately, it might be for a very good reason: your nurse holding the hand of a patient who might be taking a last breath, comforting someone who just lost a loved one, or, quite the opposite, taking the verbal/physical abuse of a drunken/irate patient. So, please cut your nurse some slack...they are doing the best they can.

CRIME OF THE 21st CENTURY...TO DATE!: FINANCIAL ABUSE OF THE ELDERLY

The elderly are being swindled out of nearly \$3 billion a year. Why? The older generation has worked hard, saved their entire lives, and has a vast amount of wealth...and the scammers know this, and are armed with speedy technology. Most cases are never reported, for fear of scorn by family, feeling ashamed, etc. You'd think common sense would prevail: If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. Take your time. Check out any proposition with a reliable, neutral source. All sound advice, but the abuse often comes from the victim's inner circle: family/friends/neighbors/strangers, often working through the haze of even slight cognitive impairment.

What to do? Red flags: getting in "on the bottom floor," decisions required "right now," "guaranteed profit" promises with minimal risk, etc. Be aware of threats; seek help from someone you trust, by going through your mail/monitoring your account statements. Keep close track of income/expenses. Get on Do Not Call lists for free: www.donotcall.gov or call 888-382-1222. Get credit reports: www.equifax.com (800-685-1111); www.experian.com (888-397-3742); www.transunion.com (800-916-8800). You're entitled to one free copy a year from each (copy from one each quarter). Your doctor may have resources for social service, legal advice, etc: www.investorprotection.org. BE AWARE!!!
