ORBITAL DEBRIS SHIELD RECEIVES RAVE REVIEWS FROM NASA

It has been known for years that space debris (pieces of man-made, non-functional hardware) has been littering the Earth's low, medium and geostationary orbits and threatening the sustainability of the satellite industry. In the U.S., the Pentagon is responsible for tracking roughly 22,000 man-made objects in orbit—with hundreds of thousands, if not millions, more objects too small to track. After several years of inaction on the part of global governments, the risk to space assets from orbital debris has skyrocketed to create frightening scenarios for functioning spacecraft.

ATK has been working on a solution to this problem in the form of a Multi-Layered Shield — a small satellite that would work as a vacuum cleaner and trash compactor to protect valuable assets in a particular region. Through a significant amount of physics analysis, it was determined that a half-sphere, with three or four of them (depending on the size of the debris threat), would be more sufficient in protecting the International Space Station. 
Lucy Grace is doing well, and enjoying staying on top of the technological world of computers. *Way to go, Lucy!*



· Possible new treatment for AMD is being studied: anti-inflammatory drugs that hitch a ride You into the eye's retina on microscopic particles that patients. These nanoparticles, called dendrimers

deliver steroids to retinas affected by AMD. The same experimental treatment also appears helpful in treating retinitis pigmentosa (RP), which is associated with many genetic conditions that affect the retina. Dry AMD and RP cause neuroinflammation and injury to the retina that can lead to blindness. The injected steroids, which were attached to the nanoparticles targeted inflammatory microglial cells associated with the neuroinflammation. When the microglial cells gobbled up the steroid-carrying while the rest of the eye remained unaffected and vision was preserved. Collaborative research will continue to demonstrate the value of designing drug-delivery systems that are small enough to be taken into cells.

- Chest Pain: Heartburn or heart attack? Many people don't realize the heart and esophagus are in close proximity. They also share similar nerve connections. Both heartburn and a heart attack can cause chest pain. which can range from mild to intense, but it's not always easy to tell which is which. Other digestive conditions can have the same effect, such as a gallbladder attack or a muscle spasm in the esophagus. Be alert if you suffer occasional bouts of heartburn: if it seems to be worse or different than usual, especially if it occurs during physical activity or is accompanied by shortness of breath, sweating, dizziness, nausea, or pain radiating into your shoulder/arm, get emergency help immediately. These signs/symptoms may indicate a heart attack. Call 911 or emergency medical help immediately. If you have been prescribed nitroglycerin, a muscle relaxant commonly used to relieve chest pain due to heart disease, it can also help relieve pain due to a muscle spasm of the esophagus. Some people who experience chest discomfort believe they're having a heart attack, but find out later their pain is caused by gastroesophageal reflux disease (GERD). In any case, it's important to get help right away since both require proper diagnosis and treatment. (Excerpted from a Mayo Clinic Special Report, 6/2012.)
- · Coffee and Health. The impact of caffeine on health has gone back and forth for years. Recent studies have indicated coffee is among the top 10 food sources of antioxidants. It's also a major source of chlorogenic acid. which is one of its star players for antioxidant activity. Antioxidant activity associated with coffee has been linked to protective effects on diseases, including cancer and cardiovascular diseases. For most healthy adults. moderate doses of caffeine (200-300 mg/day, which is 2-3 cups of regular brewed coffee) are fine. Great news for us coffee hounds!
